The Humanitarian Service Project's work continues unabated. The work was stressed even more with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the shut down of the economy in March 2020. HSP immediately sent the entire staff home to work there while the Executive Team determined our efforts going forward. All volunteers were also told to stay home. The Chairman/Co-Founder continued to work from the office and set up laptops and VPN's for the staff to use at home. Meetings were instituted on Zoom, just like everyone else in the world was doing.

We immediately applied for an SBA PPP loan, in order to maintain our staffing, in the amount of \$51,900. That loan was eventually forgiven, which helped our bottom line substantially.

We slowly began to bring staff back to the office on a hybrid schedule, so as to reduce exposure, in the month of April. We also began to allow a very limited number of volunteers back in our facility in August. Socially distancing, serious sanitizing, and mask wearing were the orders of the day. I am happy to report that we did not experience any outbreaks of COVID-19.

We continued our service to needy seniors through the pandemic with 142 receiving monthly deliveries of either 95-100 pounds of groceries and household goods or a gift card to purchase groceries from the store of their choice. We also provided gift cards instead of Christmas presents to all 142 seniors. We delivered 700 substantial birthday boxes throughout the year to children living in poverty. When the COVID-19 pandemic began we started making food packages available to all of our families for contact free curbside pick up on a weekly basis instead of the large distributions we would normally make in the summer months of June, July, and August. We raised and distributed school supplies for 3,000 children at the beginning of the school year in August, although most children were studying remotely from home. We also revised our Christmas Offering program to include gifts, books, and gift cards to 693 families, including 1,459 children. Over half of the families received groceries in their distribution. The financial and in-kind contributions from the community make all of these programs possible. Thank you to our generous donors.

We were able to add another permanent enrollment to our Senior Citizen Project thanks to a matching challenge grant from our generous donors. Thank you once more.

This last year we had to turn away more volunteers than we could accommodate, due to the pandemic restrictions. We are always blessed with so many caring people who visit our center

to offer their support in service to the community. Once we began reopening to a limited number of volunteers, we had a dedicated team that came every week or month to perform the routine tasks that must be performed to carry on our service. We are very thankful for, and proud of, the volunteers who make our work possible. It is their dedicated support that helps to make the Humanitarian Service Project so successful in its efforts to serve those in need. Thank you all.

Going forward, HSP will continue with the dramatic changes to our programs to manage the impact of COVID 19. The staff continues to work on a slightly modified hybrid schedule. We have had to accomplish our work with a very small number of volunteers and change the way we have provided service. Families will continue to be able to pick up food packages on a weekly basis. This has greatly increased our level of food distribution. Our seniors will continue to have the choice of a grocery gift card or a physical delivery of groceries. The Christmas Offering will probably be conducted in the same manner as this past year until the COVID-19 threat is confined.

Thanks to the ongoing and generous support of our donors and volunteers, and the committed work of our staff, HSP is able to meet and exceed the daily essential requirements of our mission.

The mission of the Humanitarian Service Project (HSP) is to relieve the suffering and humiliation that poverty brings to senior citizens and children in DuPage and Kane Counties.

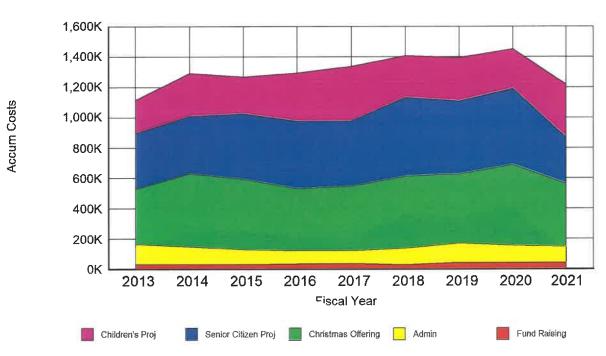
